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Families and the Gospel

September 1

Lk 14: 1, 7-14

In today's gospel, Jesus used a meal as a place to teach. Too often family meals are rushed, eaten in shifts or in the hypnotic glow of a TV. Meals are sacred times where we listen, share, appreciate and instruct. Jesus promises: "You will be blessed." Don't lose the opportunity.

September 8

Lk 14: 25-33

Today's gospel speaks about a king and a builder who failed to plan properly; one met with ridicule and the other met defeat. Don't fall in the important relation-ships in your life. Commit yourself to them. Don't leave it to chance. What specific steps can you take to enhance those relationships? When we fail to plan, we plan to fail.

September 15

Lk 15: 1-32

Show me a family without a "lost relationship" and I'll show you a family that isn't cleaning the skeletons from the closet. Maybe that person hasn't run away or left home; they sort of "drifted" away. Conversation with them is superficial and forced. In today's gospel Jesus challenges us to bring that "lost sheep" back home. Like Jesus we have to "welcome sinners and eat with them."

September 22

Lk 16: 1-13

Today's gospel has a tip for parents: "Whoever is faithful in very little is faithful also in much." Fidelity is a learned behavior. It is never too early to teach our children to be faithful to their promises, chores, and responsibilities. Of course the best teacher is the example of our own lives.

September 29

Lk 16: 19-31

The rich man in today's gospel was condemned to a "place of torment" because he never noticed poor Lazarus starving at his door. When he asked that an angel go and warn his five brothers to change their ways, it is clear that the whole family was going through life insensitive to others' needs. It was a family disease. Is your family learning to be sensitive to the poor and less fortunate? Today's gospel is a warning!

LEAD WITH HEART

"The word encouragement has its root in the Latin word *cor*, meaning 'heart'. When leaders encourage others, though recognition and celebration, they inspire them with courage—with heart. When we encourage others, we give them heart. And when we give heart to others, we give love."

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Baptism Beyond Babyhood

A baptism Sunday at church is an excellent opportunity to talk to your kids about what the sacrament means. Kids love hearing about themselves as babies, so use that as your ticket into the conversation.

Tell them about their baptism day.

What was the significance of their outfit? Tell the story how they behaved—did they cry when the water was poured? Did you have a party afterward?

Explain why you had them baptized.

Talk about the hopes you had for them when they were so small. Did you imagine them going to church with you? What did you hope for their faith?

Baptismal gifts—decade later.

If you socked away your child's baptismal gift money, consider using \$20.00 or so to buy some age-appropriate spiritual reading. Take your child to a religious gift store and give them a budget to pick out something they'd use now.

Catholic 101

Confirmation.

My daughter just asked me what Confirmation is—and I found that I couldn't quite explain it. Can you tell me more about this sacrament?

Confirmation, like Baptism; is a sacrament of initiation. Confirmation is the completion of Baptism; in the early church it was the end of the baptismal liturgy, which then led to Eucharist. Confirmation is associated with fullness of gifts of the Holy Spirit (listed at our blog, homefaith.com) given to the church at Pentecost. (Of course, you also get the spirit in Baptism.) The idea of Confirmation as a transition to an adult faith is more modern interpretation. Confirmation roots us more deeply as a child of God and unites us more closely to Christ. It increases in us the gifts of the Holy Spirit and gives us a special strength to spread the faith by word and action as a true witness of Christ

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
