Jesus refers to His Father 170 times in the Gospels. He also encourages us to call God, "Father". This month, we honor our fathers on earth and our Father in heaven.

As a family, share with each other your favorite memories of your father. Take a family hike in the woods to spend time together. Try praying the "Our Father" together as a family, but doing it slowly, and coming to understand what each line means.

As June also hosts the feast of Corpus Christi, watch a video on the Eucharist, such as "Presence" or Bishop Barron's "Eucharist" series.

Finally, if your earthly father is still living, spend some time with him. If you are a father and your children are living, remind them of how much you love them. If your father has died, make sure to pray for him, and comfort those who miss him. And don't forget to thank your parish priest, the pastoral father of your faith community.

June 7, 2020: Trinity Sunday (JN 3:16-18)

As the Father "sent his son into the world" so parents send their children into the world "so that the world might be saved." This is the missionary role of the Christian family. Your family is a school where your children develop convictions which enable them to make a difference in the world.

June 14, 2020: Body & Blood of Christ-Corpus Christi (JN 6:51-58)
