April 5 Passion (Palm) Sunday Matthew 26:14-27:66

April 12 Easter Sunday

John 20:1-9

April 19 Second Sunday of Easter - Divine Mercy Sunday John 20:19-31

April 26 Third Sunday of Easter Luke 24:13-35
