It is difficult to believe where 2017 has gone and that the Fall Clergy Conference is fast approaching. With that in mind, I am pleased to inform you that the presenter/facilitator for the Clergy Conference is Father Rev. Raymond F. Dlugos, OSA, Ph.D.

Father Ray Dlugos is an Augustinian Friar from the Villanova Province (Eastern United States) who is currently the Vice-President for Mission and Ministry at Merrimack College in North Andover, MA. Born and raised in the Philadelphia area, he was ordained a priest in 1983. He served as a high school teacher (St. John Neumann High School, Golden Gate, FL from 1984-88) and as a parish priest (St. Denis Parish, Havertown, PA from 1988-1990) before becoming the Director of Vocations for the Augustinians in 1990. He began studies in Psychology in 1994 and received a Ph.D. in Counseling Psychology from the University at Albany, State University of New York in 1999. He is a licensed psychologist in the State of New York and the Commonwealth of Massachusetts.

Upon completion of his doctoral studies, Father Ray joined the staff of the Southdown Institute in Aurora, ON in September of 1999. Founded in 1966 by a priest and a group of lay people to help priests recover effectively from alcohol abuse and dependence, The Southdown Institute evolved in a comprehensive residential treatment center helping priests and men and women vowed to religious life to recover from the entire spectrum of psychological, behavioral, and emotional disorders. Father Ray served there as a Psychologist responsible for group therapy, individual psychotherapy, and psychological assessments until being appointed Vice President in August of 2002 and elected Chief Executive Officer in June of 2003. He held that post until coming to Merrimack in 2008.

Please note that the FALL CLERGY CONFERENCE is MANDATORY. Absence requires permission from the Bishop's office prior to the event. This year's conference will take place at Seven Springs Resort for October 16 – October 18. If you must arrive late or leave early, arrangements can be accommodated to stay for one evening for the conference. If you do not send payment to the office prior to the event, your

parish will be billed following the conference. A reservation sheet accompanies this memo.

October 1

Mt. 21:28-32

In today's gospel Jesus asked, "What is your opinion?" Why do we think our opinion is dogma or fact? An opinion is only how we perceive a situation or how we feel comfortable doing something. Don't argue over or become divided by "your opinion."

October 8

Mt. 21:33-43

Children will reject many parental values as they grow up and develop their own identity. Like the landowner in today's gospel, parents may feel disappointed or rejected after investing so much of themselves. Today Jesus advises parents to make rejection "the cornerstone" of a new and richer relationship with your developing children.

October 15

Mt. 22:1-14

The king in today's gospel had a bottom line beyond which he would not negotiate. As parents we need to identify what is critical (non-negotiable) and what is open to discussion. Not all issues are equal.

October 22

Mt. 22:15-21

Jesus sounds like a frustrated parent when he says "Why are you testing me?" Children test parents because that is how they learn limits. Imitate Jesus in today's gospel: be firm but fair.

October 29

Mt. 22:34-40

In today's gospel the Pharisees were asking about a commandment (something we have to do)! And Jesus was talking about love (what we want to do with our "whole heart, mind and soul"). In families we daily lay down our lives

families we daily lay down our lives for one another, not because of a law but out of love.

Passion for Life

Madelyn sits in the last pew of church. Her thoughts and prayers go to the faces she encountered that day as the parish director of religious education.

First, she treasures the image of little Henry whose parents brought him to the Baptism class. Next, Madelyn sees Clara attending Mass with her daughter, Linda. Clara gets confused now and she's pushing 90 and needs constant care. Finally, she prays for Anna, a sophomore in high school who is six months pregnant.

A Response: Soon to be baptized, Henry weighs six pounds and came into this world two months early. Madelyn remembers the tears in Henry's parents' eyes as she shared with them God's love for their infant son. Without regret and with amazing patience, Linda put aside her busy life to be her mother's companion. Madelyn recalls Linda's words, "Once she diapered, fed and cared for me. Now it's my turn. Life comes full circle." The youth group is planning a baby shower for Anna, and the Young Mothers' group is gathering used items for a nursery. Madelyn makes a mental note to call the baby's father to see how he's doing.

Madelyn's weary "Amen" comes with knowledge that God will keep them all under the shadow of his wing. As she prepares to leave, Madelyn turns, and looks at the silent sanctuary and crucifix and thanks Jesus for this Church that cares so passionately for life.

Every Catholic parish is pro-life. We cannot be theoretically in favor of a consistent ethic of life; we must act on that conviction. From cradle to grave we must provide support and care for everyone. The most necessary support are to those in crisis. Ministry to the unborn, the marginalized, the sick and dying must be our special concern. The gospel is a guidebook in this work. Just as Jesus sought out the lepers, the lame, the Samaritan woman, the children, we need to look around our parish family and help those who struggle.

We don't need an organization or monthly meeting to live the mandate of pro-life. What we need is awareness and a decision to do something. Catholic families can do simple things like adopt a nursing home patient who has no one or volunteer to provide child care for a family who can't afford to pay a babysitter. We must pray for the sick and dying. Keeping God's family is everyone's concern. Church isn't just a place to visit once a week; it's a life choice—putting the gospel of life into action.
